

Title VI Policy Statement

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits discrimination on the basis of **race**, **color**, or **national origin** in programs and activities receiving Federal financial assistance. Specifically, Title VI (42 U.S.C. Section 2000d) provides that:

"no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discriminiation under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

The Environmental Justice component of Title VI guarantees fair treatment for all people and requires the City of Wilkes-Barre to identify and address any disproportionate impacts of its programs, policies, and activities on human health or the environmental effects on minority or low income populations. The City of Wilkes-Barre must also undertake reasonable steps to ensure that Limited English Proficiency (LEP) persons have meaningful access to the programs, services, and information the City of Wilkes-Barre provides. I. PROVISION OF TITLE VI ASSURANCES

The City of Wilkes-Barre hereby certifies that, as a condition of receiving Federal financial assistance under the U.S. Department of Justice Programs (DOJ) covered by the Nondiscrimination Provision of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Title II of ADA, Section 303 of the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Section 901 of Title IX of Education Amendment of 1972, all as amended, it will ensure that:

- a. The City of Wilkes-Barre shall comply with their Title VI Assurance, as part of their Certifications and Assurances requirement.
- b. No person, on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability or age will be subjected to discrimination in the level and quality of U.S. Department of Justice Programs benefits.
- c. The City of Wilkes-Barre will compile, maintain, and comply, Title VI information required and in compliance with the Department of Justice's Title VI Regulation, 28 CFR, Part 42.406.
- d. The City of Wilkes-Barre will make it known to the public that those persons alleging discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability or age as it relates to the U.S. Department of Justice Programs may file a complaint with the Office for Civil Rights, Office of Justice Programs.

II. TITLE VI POLICY STATEMENT

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits discrimination on the basis of **race**, **color**, or **national origin** in programs and activities receiving Federal financial assistance. Specifically, Title VI (42 U.S.C. Section 2000d) provides that:

III. INCORPORATION OF THE PROGRAM

The City of Wilkes-Barre (hereinafter referred to as the "Recipient") hereby agrees that, as a condition to receiving any Federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Justice Programs, it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C. 2000d-42 U.S.C. 2000d-4 (hereinafter referred to as the "Act I"), and all requirements imposed by or pursuant to Nondiscrimination Provision of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Street Act of 1968, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Title II of ADA,

Section 303 of the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Section 901 of Title IX of Education Amendment of 1972, all as amended, (hereinafter referred to as the "Act II"), and other pertinent directives. No person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability or age be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance from the Department of Justice, and HEREBY GIVES ASSURANCE THAT it will promptly take any measures necessary to effectuate this agreement.

More specifically, and without limiting the above general assurance, the Recipient hereby gives the following specific assurances with respect to its U.S. Department of Justice Programs:

- a. That the Recipient agrees that each "program" and each "facility" will be (with regard to a "program") conducted, or will be (with regard to a "facility") operated, in compliance with all requirements imposed by, or pursuant to, the Regulations.
- b. That the Recipient shall insert the following notification in all solicitations for bids for work or material subject to the Regulations and made in connection with all U.S. Department of Justice Programs and, in adapted form in all proposals or negotiated agreements:

The City of Wilkes-Barre, in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C. 2000d to 2000d-4 and 28 CFR Part 42, Nondiscrimination in Federally-Assisted Programs of the Department of Justice issued pursuant to such Act, hereby notifies all bidders/proposers that it will affirmatively insure that in any contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement, minority business enterprises will be afforded full opportunity to submit bids in response to the invitation and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability or age in consideration for an award.

- c. That the Recipient shall insert the clauses contained herein in every contract subject to this Act I and ACT II.
- d. That the Recipient shall insert the clauses contained herein as a covenant running with the land, in any deed from the United States affecting a transfer of real property, structures, or improvements thereon, or interest herein.
- e. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance to construct a facility, or part of a facility, the assurance shall extend to the entire facility and facilities operated in connection therewith.
- f. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance in the form, or for the acquisition of real property or an interest in real property, the assurance shall extend to rights to space on, over or under such property.
- g. That the Recipient shall include the appropriate clauses contained herein as a covenant running with the land, in any future deeds, leases, permits, licenses, and similar agreements entered into by the Recipient with other parties: (a) for the subsequent transfer of real property acquired or improved under U.S. Department of Justice programs; and (b) for the construction or use of, or access to, space on, over, or under real property acquired, or improved under U.S. Department of Justice Programs.

- h. That this assurance obligates the Recipient for the period during which Federal financial assistance is extended to the program, except where the Federal financial assistance is to provide, or is in the form of personal property or real property or interest therein or structures or improvements thereon, in which case the assurance obligates the Recipient or any transferee for the longer of the following periods: (a) the period during which the property is used for a purpose for which the Federal financial assistance is extended, or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits; or (b) the period during which the Recipient retains ownership or possession of the property.
- i. The Recipient shall provide for such methods of administration for the programs as are found by the Attorney General or the official to whom he/she delegates specific authority to give reasonable guarantee that it, other interest, and other participants of Federal financial assistance under such program will comply with all requirements imposed or pursuant to the Act I, Act II and this assurance.
- j. The Recipient agrees that the United States has a right to seek judicial enforcement with regard to any matter arising under the Act I, Act II, and this assurance.
- k. The Recipient assures that the level and quality of services and related benefits are provided in a manner consistent with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

THESE ASSURANCES are given in consideration of, and for the purpose of, obtaining any and all Federal grants, loans, contracts, property, discounts or other Federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to the recipient by the U.S. Department of Justice Programs and is binding on it, other recipients, subgrantees, contractors, subcontractors, transferees, successors in interest and other participants in the U.S. Department of Justice Programs.

IV. GENERAL GUIDELINES/REQUIREMENTS

a. Annual Certifications and Assurances

As stated in Section I, the City of Wilkes-Barre shall comply with their Title VI assurance, as part of their Certifications and Assurances requirement.

b. Complaint Procedures

In compliance with 28 CFR Section 42.408, the City of Wilkes-Barre has developed procedures for investigating and tracking Title VI complaints filed against them. Such procedures shall be made available to the public upon request. The City of Wilkes-Barre's complaint procedures and complaint form are contained herein as **APPENDIX A**.

c. Record Title VI Activities

In compliance with 28 CFR Section 42.408, the City of Wilkes-Barre shall prepare and maintain a list of any active investigations conducted by entities other than the DOJ, lawsuits, or complaints naming the City of Wilkes-Barre that allege discrimination on the basis of race, color, nation origin, religion or sex. Such list shall include:

- 1) Date the investigation, lawsuit, or complaint was filed;
- 2) Summary of the allegation(s);
- 3) The status of the investigation, lawsuit, or complaint; and
- 4) Actions taken by the City of Wilkes-Barre in response to the investigation, lawsuit or complaint.
- 5) The City of Wilkes-Barre has not had any transit-related investigations, complaints & lawsuits in the past 3 years.

d. Access for LEP Persons

The City of Wilkes-Barre shall take steps to ensure meaningful access to the benefits, services, information, and other important portions of their programs and activities for individuals who are Limited English Proficient (LEP). The City of Wilkes-Barre will assist persons with limited English proficiency to participate in the transportation planning process. The City of Wilkes-Barre Staff will make every effort to provide translators and document translation, where feasible, upon request. The City of Wilkes-Barre's Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan is contained herein as **APPENDIX B**.

e. Public Notification

In compliance with 28 CFR Section 42.405, the City of Wilkes-Barre shall provide information to the public regarding their Title VI obligations and apprise members of the public of the protections against discrimination afforded to them by the Title VI. Information regarding Title VI can be found on the City of Wilkes-Barre's website at wilkes-barre.city

f. <u>Additional Information</u>

The City of Wilkes-Barre acknowledges that additional information may be requested, in writing of the City of Wilkes-Barre, to investigate complaints of discrimination or to resolve concerns about possible noncompliance with Title VI.

g. <u>Timely Submission</u>

The City of Wilkes-Barre acknowledges that their Title VI review and/or updates thereto, shall be once every three (3) years. The review shall include, but is not limited to:

- A summary of public outreach and involvement activities undertaken since the last submission and a description of steps taken to ensure that minority and low-income people had meaningful access to these activities;
- 2) The city of Wilkes-Barre's process for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP);
- 3) Title VI Complaint and Tracking procedures;
- 4) A list of any Title VI investigations, complaints or lawsuits filed since the last submission; and
- 5) A copy of the City of Wilkes-Barre's public notice regarding Title VI compliance and public access and instructions to the City of Wilkes-Barre's Title VI complaint procedures.

h. Environmental Analysis of Construction Projects

The City of Wilkes-Barre shall integrate an environmental justice analysis into their National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) documentation of construction projects of which require NEPA. If a Categorical Exclusion (CE) is performed, the City of Wilkes-Barre shall complete the standard CE checklist which includes a section on community disruption and environmental justice. While preparing an Environmental Assessment (EA) or Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), the City of Wilkes-Barre shall integrate into their documents, the following:

- A description of the low-income and minority population within the study area affected by the project, and a discussion of the method used to identify this population.
 (Currently there are no pending construction projects that would negatively impact minority communities in the City of Wilkes-Barre;)
- 2) A discussion of all adverse effects that would affect the identified minority and low-income population;
- 3) A discussion of all positive effects that would affect the identified minority and low-income population;

- 4) A description of all mitigation and environmental enhancement actions incorporated into the project to address the adverse effects, including, but not limited to, any special features of the relocation program that go beyond the requirements of the Uniform Relocation Act and address adverse community effects such as separation or cohesion issues, and the replacement of the community resources destroyed by the project, if applicable;
- 5) A discussion of the remaining effects, if any, and why further mitigation is not proposed; and
- 6) For projects that traverse predominantly minority and low-income and predominantly non-minority and non-low-income areas, a comparison will be completed of mitigation and environmental enhancement actions between the two stated areas. If there is no basis for such a comparison, the City of Wilkes-Barre shall describe why this is so.

i. <u>Public Participation</u>

The City of Wilkes-Barre shall seek out and consider viewpoints of minority, low-income, and LEP populations in the course of conducting public outreach and involvement activities in regards to proposed transportation decisions. The City of Wilkes-Barre shall make every effort to include the following practices:

- 1) Coordination with individuals, institutions, or organizations and implementing community-based public involvement strategies to reach out to members in the affected minority and/or low-income communities;
- 2) Provision of opportunities for public participation through means other than written communication, such as personal interviews or use of audio or video recording devices to capture oral comments;
- 3) Utilization of locations, facilities and meeting times that are convenient and accessible to low-income and minority communities;
- 4) Utilization of different meeting sizes or formats, or varying the type and number of news media used to announce public participation opportunities; and
- 5) Implementation of DOJ's policy guidance regarding the City of Wilkes-Barre's responsibilities to LEP persons.



APPENDIX A

TITLE VI PUBLIC NOTICE OF RIGHTS / COMPLAINT PROCESS City of Wilkes-Barre

Public Notice of Rights

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 requires that no person in the United States, on the grounds of race, color or national origin be excluded from, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance. Presidential Executive Order 12898 addresses environmental justice in minority and low-income populations. Presidential Executive Order 13166 addresses services to those individuals with limited English proficiency.

Any person who believes that they have been excluded from, denied the benefits of, or been subjected to discrimination may file a written complaint with the City of Wilkes-Barre Title VI Compliance Officer. Federal and State law requires complaints be filed within one-hundred eighty (180) calendar days of the last alleged incident.

<u>Title VI Information, Limited English Proficient (LEP) information and Complaint Process (for printed materials, website, and other mediums upon request)</u>

The City of Wilkes-Barre grants all citizens equal access to all its transportation services. It is further the intent of the City of Wilkes-Barre that all citizens are aware of their rights to such access. This is designed to serve as an educational tool for citizens so that they may understand one of the civil rights laws that protect their benefit of the City of Wilkes-Barre's programs and services, specifically, as it relates to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

What is Title VI?

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 is the Federal law that protects individuals from discrimination on the basis of their race, color, or national origin in programs that receive Federal financial assistance.

"No person or group of persons shall be discriminated against with regard to the routing, scheduling, or quality of transportation service furnished by the City of Wilkes-Barre on the basis of race, color, or national origin. Frequency of service, age and quality of vehicles assigned to routes, quality of stations serving different routes, and location of routes may not be determined on the basis of race, color or national origin."

What is LEP?

As part of Title VI requirements, the City of Wilkes-Barre has developed a Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan to help identify reasonable steps to provide language assistance for LEP persons seeking meaningful access to the City of Wilkes-Barre's services as required by Executive Order 13166 "Improving Access to Services for Persons With Limited English Proficiency," reprinted at 65 FR 50121 (August 16, 2000). A Limited English Proficiency person is one who does not speak English as their primary language and who has a limited ability to read, speak, write, or understand English.

How can I file a discrimination complaint?

Any person who believes that they have, individually, or as a member of any specific class of persons, been subjected to discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin may file a complaint with the City of Wilkes-Barre, Title VI Coordinator.

These procedures do not deny the right of the complainant to file formal complaints with other State or Federal agencies or to seek private counsel for complaints alleging discrimination. Every effort will be made to obtain early resolution of complaints at the lowest level possible. The option of informal mediation meeting(s) between the affected parties and the City of Wilkes-Barre may be utilized for resolution. Any individual, group of individuals or entity that believes they have been subjected to discrimination prohibited under Title VI and related statutes may file a complaint.

The following measures will be taken to resolve Title VI complaints:

1) A formal complaint must be filed within 180 days of the alleged occurrence. Complaints shall be in writing and signed by the individual or his/her representative, and will include the complainant's name, address and telephone number; name of alleged discriminating official, basis of complaint (race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age), and the date of alleged act(s). A statement detailing the facts and circumstances of the alleged discrimination must accompany all complaints.

The City of Wilkes-Barre strongly encourages the use of the attached <u>City of Wilkes-Barre's Title VI</u> <u>Complaint Form</u> when filing official complaints.

The preferred method is to file your complaint in writing using the <u>City of Wilkes-Barre's Title VI</u> <u>Complaint Form</u>, and sending it to:

- 2) In the case where a complainant is unable or incapable of providing a written statement, a verbal complaint of discrimination may be made to the City of Wilkes-Barre's Title VI Coordinator. Under these circumstances, the complainant will be interviewed, and the City of Wilkes-Barre's Title VI Coordinator will assist the Complainant in converting the verbal allegations to writing.
- When a complaint is received, the Title VI Coordinator will provide written acknowledgment to the Complainant, within ten (10) days by registered mail.

- 4) If a complaint is deemed incomplete, additional information will be requested, and the Complainant will be provided 60 business days to submit the required information. Failure to do so may be considered good cause for a determination of no investigative merit.
- Within 15 business days from receipt of a complete complaint, the City of Wilkes-Barre will determine its jurisdiction in pursuing the matter and whether the complaint has sufficient merit to warrant investigation. Within five (5) days of this decision, the General Manager or his/her authorized designee will notify the Complainant and Respondent, by registered mail, informing them of the disposition.
 - a. If the decision is not to investigate the complaint, the notification shall specifically state the reason for the decision.
 - b. If the complaint is to be investigated, the notification shall state the grounds of the City of Wilkes-Barre's jurisdiction, while informing the parties that their full cooperation will be required in gathering additional information and assisting the investigator.
- 6) When the City of Wilkes-Barre does not have sufficient jurisdiction, the City of Wilkes-Barre or its authorized designee will refer the complaint to the appropriate State or Federal agency holding such jurisdiction.
- 7) If the complaint has investigative merit, the City of Wilkes-Barre or its authorized designee will instruct the Title VI Coordinator to fully investigate the complaint. A complete investigation will be conducted, and an investigative report will be submitted to the General Manager within 60 days from receipt of the complaint. The report will include a narrative description of the incident, summaries of all persons interviewed, and a finding with recommendations and conciliatory measures where appropriate. If the investigation is delayed for any reason, the Title VI Coordinator will notify the appropriate authorities, and an extension will be requested.
- 8) The City of Wilkes-Barre or its authorized designee will issue letters of finding to the Complainant and Respondent within 90 days from receipt of the complaint.
- 9) If the Complainant is dissatisfied with the City of Wilkes-Barre's resolution of the complaint, he/she has the right to file a complaint with the:

Your Rights under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 requires that no person in the United States, on the grounds of race, color or national origin be excluded from, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance. Presidential Executive Order 12898 addresses environmental justice in minority and low-income populations. Presidential Executive Order 13166 addresses services to those individuals with limited English proficiency.

Any person who believes that they have been excluded from, denied the benefits of, or been subjected to discrimination may file a written complaint with the City of Wilkes-Barre Title VI Compliance Officer. Federal and State law requires complaints be filed within one-hundred eighty (180) calendar days of the last alleged incident.

I. INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this limited English proficiency policy guidance is to clarify the responsibilities of recipients of federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) and assist them in fulfilling their responsibilities to limited English proficient (LEP) persons, pursuant to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and implementing regulations. It was prepared in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. 2000d, et seq., and its implementing regulations provide that no person shall be subjected to discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin under any program or activity that receives federal financial assistance, and;

II. EXECUTIVE ORDER 13166

Executive Order 13166 "Improving Access to Services for Persons With Limited English Proficiency," reprinted at 65 FR 50121 (August 16, 2000), directs each Federal agency that is subject to the requirements of Title VI to publish guidance for its respective recipients clarifying that obligation. Executive Order 13166 further directs that all such guidance documents be consistent with the compliance standards and framework detailed in the Department of Justice's (DOJ's) Policy Guidance entitled "Enforcement of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964--National Origin Discrimination Against Persons With Limited English Proficiency." (See 65 FR 50123, August 16, 2000 DOJ's General LEP Guidance). Different treatment based upon a person's inability to speak, read, write, or understand English may be a type of national origin discrimination.

Executive Order 13166 applies to all federal agencies and all programs and operations of entities that receive funding from the federal government, including state agencies, local agencies, and governments, private and non-profit entities, and subrecipients.

III. PLAN SUMMARY

The City of Wilkes-Barre has developed this Limited English Proficiency Plan (LEP) to help identify reasonable steps to provide language assistance for LEP persons seeking meaningful access to the City of Wilkes-Barre's services as required by Executive Order 13166. A Limited English Proficiency person is one who does not speak English as their primary language and who has a limited ability to read, speak, write, or understand English.

This plan details procedures on how to identify a person who may need language assistance, the ways in which assistance may be provided, training staff, how to notify LEP persons that assistance is available, and information for future plan updates.

In developing the plan while determining the city of Wilkes-Barre's extent of obligation to provide LEP services, the City of Wilkes-Barre undertook a four factor LEP analysis which considers the following: 1) The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible in the City of Wilkes-Barre's service area who may be served or likely to encounter a City of Wilkes-Barre program, activity, or service; 2) the frequency with which LEP individuals come in contact with the City of Wilkes-Barre's services; 3) the nature and importance of the program, activity or service provided by the City of Wilkes-Barre to the LEP population; and 4) the resources available to the City of Wilkes-Barre and overall costs to provide LEP assistance. A brief description of these considerations is provided in the following section.

IV FOUR FACTOR ANALYSES

- 1. The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible in the City of Wilkes-Barre's service area who may be served or likely to encounter a City of Wilkes-Barre program, activity, or service.
- 2. The frequency with which LEP individuals come in contact with a City of Wilkes-Barre program, activity, or service.

The City of Wilkes-Barre assesses the frequency at which staff have or could possibly have contact with LEP persons.

3. The nature and importance of the program, activity, or service provided by the City of Wilkes-Barre to LEP community.

There is no large geographic concentration of any one type of LEP individuals in the City of Wilkes-Barre's service area. The majority (89%) of the service area population speaks only English.

Therefore, the focus of social, service, professional and leadership organizations within the City of Wilkes-Barre's service area has been on a limited basis with population spread out within the community.

4. The resources available to the City of Wilkes-Barre and overall costs.

The City of Wilkes-Barre assessed its available resources that could be used for providing LEP assistance. This included identifying translation companies and cost, including Spanish subtitles in brochures, and what level of staff training is needed.

After analyzing the four factors, the City of Wilkes-Barre developed the plan outlined in the following section for assisting persons of limited English proficiency.

V LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY PLAN OUTLINE

- a) How to Identify an LEP Person who Needs Language Assistance Below are tools to help identify persons who may need language assistance:
 - Examine records requests for language assistance from past meetings and events to anticipate the possible need for assistance at upcoming meetings;
 - When the City of Wilkes-Barre's sponsored workshops or public hearings are held, set up a signin sheet table, have a staff member greet and briefly speak to each attendee. To informally gage the attendee's ability to speak and understand English, ask a question that requires a full sentence reply;
 - Have the Census Bureau's "I Speak Cards" at the workshop or public hearing sign-in sheet table (contained herein as <u>SECTION B</u>). While staff may not be able to provide translation assistance at this meeting, the cards are an excellent tool to identify language needs for future meetings. Also, have the cards available at the City Government Customer Service Area; and
 - Survey employees and other first line staff of any direct or indirect contact with LEP individuals.

Through an analysis of the American Community Survey (ACS) - 5 Year Estimates (2008-2012) the City of Wilkes-Barre's statistical data indicated that the largest concentration of citizens who speak English less than "very well" were Spanish or Spanish Creole (Total population 38,907 & Spanish or Spanish Creole 1,034). In order to accommodate persons who need LEP assistance the City of Wilkes-Barre has available interpretive language services. In addition, the city is currently translating important notices and documents, including Title VI policy, into Spanish based on the above mentioned data.

- b) <u>Language Assistance Measures</u> The City of Wilkes-Barre has or will implement the following LEP procedures. The creation of these steps are based on the very low percentage of persons speaking other languages or not speaking English at least "well," and the lack of resources available in the City of Wilkes-Barre's service area:
 - Census Bureau's "I Speak Cards" are to be located at all City of Wilkes-Barre Offices at all times.
 - When an interpreter is needed, in person or on the telephone, staff will first attempt to determine what language is required.
- c) <u>Staff Training</u> All City of Wilkes-Barre staff will be provided with the LEP Plan and will be educated on procedures to follow. This information will also be part of the City of Wilkes-Barre's staff orientation process for new hires. Training topics are listed below:
 - Understanding the Title VI policy and LEP responsibilities;
 - What language assistance services the City of Wilkes-Barre offers;
 - Use of LEP "I Speak Cards";
 - How to use the Language Resource Directory for interpretation and translation services;
 - Documentation of language assistance requests;
 - How to handle a Title VI and/or LEP complaint
- **d)** Outreach Techniques The following are a few options that the City of Wilkes-Barre will incorporate when and/or if the need arises for LEP outreach:
 - If staff knows that they will be presenting a topic that could be of potential importance to an LEP person or if staff will be hosting a meeting or a workshop in a geographic location with a known concentration of LEP persons, meeting notices, fliers, advertisements, and agendas will be printed in an alternative language, based on known LEP population in the area.
 - When running a general public meeting notice, staff will insert the clause, based on the LEP population and when relevant, that translates into "A (insert alternative Language) translator will be available". For example: "<u>Un traductor del idioma español estará disponible</u>" This means "A Spanish translator will be available".
 - Key print materials, including but limited to schedules and maps, will be translated and made available at the City of Wilkes-Barre's Transit Center, on board vehicles and in communities when a specific and concentrated LEP population is identified or a request is made.

e) Monitoring and Updating the LEP Plan - This plan is designed to be flexible and is one that can be easily updated. At a minimum, the City of Wilkes-Barre will follow the Title VI Program update schedule for the LEP Plan.

Each update should examine all plan components such as:

- How many LEP persons were encountered?
- Were their needs met?
- What is the current LEP population in the City of Wilkes-Barre's service area?
- Has there been a change in the types of languages where translation services are needed?
- Is there still a need for continued language assistance for previously identified City of Wilkes-Barre programs? Are there other programs that should be included?
- Have the City of Wilkes-Barre's available resources, such as technology, staff, and financial costs changed?
- Has the City of Wilkes-Barre fulfilled the goals of the LEP Plan? and
- Were any complaints received?

The City of Wilkes-Barre will continuously analyze the American Community Survey data, as it becomes available, to accommodate persons with LEP.

f) <u>Dissemination of the City of Wilkes-Barre's Limited English Proficiency Plan</u> - The City of Wilkes-Barre includes the LEP Plan with its Title VI Policy and Complaint Procedures. The City of Wilkes-Barre's Notice of Rights under Title VI to the public is posted in the City of Wilkes-Barre's office, on the website at easyriderbus.com, in the route guide on all the City of Wilkes-Barre's vehicles, and in selected printed materials and also refers to the LEP Plan's availability.

Any person, including social service, non-profit, and law enforcement agencies and other community partners with internet access will be able to access the plan.

Copies of the LEP Plan will be provided, on request, to any person(s) requesting the document via phone, in person, by mail or email. LEP persons may obtain copies/translations of the plan upon request.
